5. Who did Paul meet with in Jerusalem and what did he rehearse with them (21:15-19)?
6. What had many of the believing Jews heard concerning Paul (21:20-22)?
7. What was Paul counseled to do and how did he respond (21:23-26)?
8. What did Jews from Asia do to Paul in the temple (21:27-30)?
9. What did the Roman commander do to Paul (21:31-36)?
10. What did Paul request of the commander as he was being taken into the barracks o the Roman soldiers (21:37-40)?

Digging Deeper

1. Where are the following places located: Cos, Rhodes, Patara, Phoenicia, Cyprus, Syria, Tyre, Ptolemais, Caesarea, and Jerusalem (21:1-16)?
2. Where previously in Acts do we read about "Philip the evangelist" (21:8)?
3. What did Peter say on Pentecost that would indicate that "daughters" would also prophesy (21:9)?
4. What prophecy of Agabus is recorded previously in the book of Acts (21:10)?
5. What was one reason why Paul came to Jerusalem (21:17; 24:17)?
6. Which James is mentioned in 21:18?
7. Where previously in Acts did Paul tell Jewish brethren about what God did among the Gentiles in their conversion (21:19)?
8. Where previously in Acts is it said that Paul had taken a vow similar to the one mentioned in 21:23-24?
9. Why was Paul in favor of a Jewish custom here in 21:23-26, but he was opposed to in other cases like Galatians 2:3-5 or Colossians 2:16-23?
10. Where previously in Acts was the letter of 21:25 mentioned?

- 11. What did Paul say later in Acts that refers to his being mobbed in the temple (21:27-31; 24:18; 26:21)? How was the Jews' charge against Paul in 21:28 similar to the charge against Stephen in 6:11-14?
- 12. Where do we eventually learn the name of this Roman commander (21:31)?

Applications for Today

- 1. Praying together with our brethren for their future safety is a good practice (21:5; Rom. 15:30).
- 2. Let us, like Paul, always be ready to sacrifice our lives for the name of the Lord Jesus (21:13; Rom. 12:1; Phil. 2:17; 4:18; Heb. 13:15).
- 3. Let us always resign our will to the Lord's will (21:14; Jas. 4:15).
- 4. God is to be glorified for the great things he does for the salvation of others through the ministry of godly Christians (21:19-20; Acts 11:18; Gal. 1:24).
- 5. When possible, be willing to do things within the realm of good judgment to make peace with others as long as it does not violate plain principles of scripture (21:23-26; 1 Cor. 10:23-33).
- 6. Just because someone charges you with an accusation doesn't make it true (21:28; Mk. 15:3-4).
- 7. Just because someone supposes something about you doesn't make it true (21:29; Jn. 7:24; 1 Tim. 6:4).
- 8. Be respectful even in the face of mistreatment (21:37-40; Rom. 12:17-21; 1 Pet. 2:23).
