Chapter 8 Overview

The New Testament church at the end of the first century was persecuted. Roman persecution would force Christians to keep quiet about Jesus, keep quiet about sin (idolatry, immorality), and keep quiet about God's judgment. These Christians needed a reminder of the responsibility to get the gospel message out - a message of warning, of repentance and victory...

Chapter 8 Overview

... (8:2; 10:7, 11; 11:3, 6-7, 10, 18-19). Trumpets in Bible times were used to call assemblies, to journey, to celebrate, and to wage war (Num. 10:1-9). Trumpets were also used to warn (Ezek. 33:3; Amos 3:6; Hos. 5:8). Christ's message in Revelation is one of warning (8:2,6) and harsh punishment: three "woes" (8:13; 9:12; 11:14).

Chapter 8 Overview

The severity of this divine, but partial judgment, was designed to bring about repentance (9:20-21; 16:9, 11, 21) upon the ungodly (9:4).

- The first trumpet sounded a third of the land destroyed (8:7; see Ex. 7-12)
- The second trumpet sounded a third of the sea waters destroyed (8:8-9)
- The third trumpet sounded a third of the land waters destroyed (8:10-11)
- The fourth trumpet sounded a third of the heavenly bodies destroyed (8:12)

- The fifth trumpet sounded ungodly men tormented five months, but not killed (9:1-12)
- The sixth trumpet sounded a third of the men were destroyed (9:13-21). (The six trumpets show that Rome would be judged by three things: natural calamity [1st 4th], internal rottenness [5th], and external invasion [6th]. This judgment was divine judgment (see 8:2; 9:13-14; and 11:17-18)

- Chapter 10:1 11:14 is an interlude between the 6th and 7th trumpets, just like Chapter 7 is an interlude between the 6th and 7th seals.
- The seventh trumpet sounded the final destruction of God's enemies and complete victory over them (11:15-19). (Note that a picture of the Ark of the Covenant closes this section which puts the emphasis again on God's Word, His covenant.)


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
Rome and Parthia

The wars between Rome and the Parthian Empire, which took place roughly from 53 BC to 217 AD, were a unique episode in classical history. Although Rome conquered nearly the entire civilized world around the Mediterranean, Rome could never conquer Parthia. When Roman expansion reached Mesopotamia, the Parthian Empire had already been prospering as a major power whose outskirts reached far into the east and trade routes ran deep into China. When Roman and Parthian borders finally met, the centuries that followed were a time of diplomacy and war between two empires of distinct cultures and methods of war. (allempires.com)










The Four Interludes of the Book of Revelation

- 1. Chapter 4-5: God on his throne, and Jesus at his right hand, are in control of the persecution going on
- 2. Chapter 7: God's faithful saints are <u>sealed</u> (protected) from the persecution that is going on
- 3. Chapter 10:1 11:14: God has a bitter sweet <u>prophetic</u> message that must be proclaimed about the persecution
- 4. Chapter 12 14: The war between Jesus (and his followers) and Satan (and his followers) is the <u>reason</u> behind (cause for) the persecution that is going on

Chapter 10 Overview

Christ's message for all mankind must be revealed (10:1-6), heard (10:7), understood: both positive and negative (10:9-10; see Ezek.2:8 - 3:3), and preached to all (10:11).

- An open book the message can be understood (Eph. 3:4)
- A tasteful book the message is positive and negative (2 Cor. 2:14-16)
- A proclaimed book the message is to be preached (Rom. 10:14-15)

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The Length of the Time of Persecution

Time	Activity	
42 months	Holy city trodden under foot (11:2) Beast given power (13:5)	
1260 days	Witnesses prophesy (11:3) Woman flees into – wilderness (12:6)	
3 ½ years (time, times, half a time)	Saints are persecuted (Dan. 7:25; 12:7) Woman is nourished (12:14)	

Note that 42 months (11:2; 13:5), 1260 days (11:3; 12:6), and 3 ½ years (12:14; see Dan. 7:25; 12:7), all refer to a time of persecution and testing of Christians by Rome.

Chapter 11 Overview

Christ's message was preached in the NT church: a life of protection through persecution (11:1-2), a life of success (11:3-6), a life of temporary defeat (11:7-10), a life of revival (11:11), and a life of exaltation (11:12-14). Note that "two" in the Bible represents confirmation (Deut. 19:15), strength (Eccl. 4:9-12), and fellowship (Lk. 10:1).

Chapter 11 Overview

Chapter 11 is a miniature picture of the whole NT and of the book of Revelation. The NT church will preach on earth (11:1-6), will be persecuted by Rome (11:7-10), and will be prized in heaven (11:11-19).





How many will be resurrected to heaven?

The Bible indicates that 144,000 people will be resurrected to heavenly life. (Revelation 7:4) In the vision recorded at Revelation 14:1-3, the apostle John saw "the Lamb standing on Mount Zion, and with him 144,000." In this vision, "the Lamb" represents the resurrected Jesus. (John 1:29; 1 Peter 1:19) "Mount Zion" represents the exalted position of Jesus and the 144,000 who rule with him in the heavens.—Psalm 2:6; Hebrews 12:22.

Those "who are called and chosen" to rule with Christ in the Kingdom are referred to as a "little flock." (Revelation 17:14; Luke 12:32) This shows that they would be relatively few in comparison with the complete number of Jesus' sheep.—John 10:16. (https://www.jw.org/en/bible-teachings/questions/go-to-heaven/)

Misconception: The number 144,000 mentioned in Revelation is symbolic, not literal.

Fact: Although Revelation contains symbolic numbers, some of the numbers it uses are literal. For example, it speaks of "the 12 names of the 12 apostles of the Lamb." (Revelation 21:14) Consider the evidence for concluding that the number 144,000 should likewise be taken literally.

Revelation 7:4 records "the number of those who were sealed [or, confirmed for life in heaven], 144,000." In the immediate context of this verse, a second group is contrasted: "a great crowd, which no man was able to number." Those of the "great crowd" also receive salvation from God. (Revelation 7:9, 10) If the number 144,000 were symbolic, referring instead to a group without number, then the contrast between the two groups would be lost. In addition, the 144,000 are described as being "bought from among mankind as firstfruits." (Revelation 14:4) The expression "firstfruits" refers to a small representative selection. It aptly describes those who will rule in heaven with Christ over an undetermined number of subjects on earth.—Revelation 5:10. (https://www.jw.org/en/bible-teachings/questions/go-to-heaven/)

- The J.W.s say that 144,000 (7:4; 14:1-5) is a literal number; the only ones in the true church who go to heaven; the great multitude (7:9) are in Paradise on a restored earth (see 2 Pet. 3:10 in the NWT)
- Note that "Israel" is listed. Is this literal? Are Jews only in heaven?

 Note that Dan is missing from the list and Manasseh takes his place (with Joseph)

- Note that in 7:4, John <u>heard</u> the number (144,000), and in 7:9, John <u>saw</u> a great multitude
- Note that the "great multitude" are "before the throne" in heaven (7:9, 15) just like the 144, 000 (14:3)
- Note that the 144,000 are "purchased", the same as those in 5:9


- Note that the 144,000 are (symbolically) virgin men (14:4). Are there no women in heaven?
- Who are the 144,000? Simply, all the faithful "servants of our God" who go through the persecution (1:1; 2:20; 6:11; 7:3; 10:7; 11:18; 19:2, 5; 22:3, 6)

- 1. The great multitude is of every nation (7:9)
- 2. Every nation is purchased (5:9) and the 144,000 are purchased (14:3-4)
- 3. Therefore, 144,000 (7:4) are a part of the great multitude (7:9)

- 1. The great multitude is dressed in white robes (7:9, 13-14)
- 2. Those who wash their robes have access to the tree of life and the city, both of which are in heaven (22:1-3, 14)
- 3. Therefore, the great multitude will be in heaven
